I. HUMANISM DENIES THE EXISTANCE OF GOD

"Religious humanists regard the universe as self-existing and not created." – The First Belief of the Humanistic Creed

Psalm 14:1 & 53:1, "The fool hath said in his heart, There is no God."

Romans 1:20-22, "20 For the invisible things of him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even his eternal power and Godhead; so that they are without excuse: 21 Because that, when they knew God, they glorified him not as God, neither were thankful; but became vain in their imaginations, and their foolish heart was darkened. 22 Professing themselves to be wise, they became fools,"

Psalm 19:1, "The heavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament sheweth his handywork."

Titus 1:15-16, "15 Unto the pure all things are pure: but unto them that are defiled and unbelieving is nothing pure; but even their mind and conscience is defiled. 16 They profess that they know God; but in works they deny him, being abominable, and disobedient, and unto every good work reprobate."

II. HUMANISM DENIES THE AUTHORITY OF GOD'S WORD

"Humanism asserts that the nature of the universe depicted by modern science makes unacceptable any supernatural or cosmic guarantees of human values." – The Fifth Belief of the Humanistic Creed

A. THE SOCIETAL IMPLICATIONS

Psalm 119:160, "Thy word is true from the beginning: and every one of thy righteous judgments endureth for ever."

Psalm 12:6-7, "The words of the LORD are pure words: as silver tried in a furnace of earth, purified seven times. Thou shalt keep them, O LORD, thou shalt preserve them from this generation for ever."

B. THE RELIGIOUS IMPLICATIONS

Colossians 3:16, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom;"

Psalm 119:11, "Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee."

119:9, "Wherewithal shall a young man cleanse his way? by taking heed thereto according to thy word."

Hebrews 4:12, "For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any twoedged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart."

III. HUMANISTS DENY THE IMAGE OF GOD IN MAN

"Humanism believes that man is a part of nature and that he has emerged as a result of a continuous process." – The Second Belief of the Humanistic Creed

Genesis 1:27, "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them."

The way God created us reveals the purpose of our existence. We are designed that the image of God might be restored in our lives. We are to reflect God's image.

Romans 8:29, "Whom he did foreknow, he also did predestinate to be conformed to the image of his Son."

IV. HUMANISM DENIES THE EXISTENCE OF THE SOUL

"Holding an organic view of life, humanists find that the traditional dualism of mind and body must be rejected." The Third Belief of the Humanistic Creed

II Corinthians 5:8, "We are confident, I say, and willing rather to be absent from the body, and to be present with the Lord."

I Thessalonians 5:23, "And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ."

V. HUMANISM DENIES THE NEED FOR THE CHURCH

"We are convinced that the time has passed for theism, deism, modernism, and the several varieties of "new thought". The Sixth Belief of the Humanistic Creed

"In the place of the old attitudes involved in worship and prayer the humanist finds his religious emotions expressed in a heightened sense of personal life and in a cooperative effort to promote social well-being." The Ninth Belief of the Humanistic Creed

"It follows that there will be no uniquely religious emotions and attitudes of the kind hitherto associated with belief in the supernatural." 2nd Belief of the Humanistic Creed

Matthew 16:18, "And I say also unto thee, That thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

I Timothy 3:15, ". . . that thou mayest know how thou oughtest to behave thyself in the house of God, which is the church of the living God, the pillar and ground of the truth."
